he 11th World University Judo Championship was organised in Brussels from December 12th to 16th, 1990. It knew a great success thanks to the quality and the number of participants (men and women) but also thanks to the quality of the organisation. The organisers had really well prepared this championship, according to the observers, on the technical and administrative point of view.

The competitions' level can be compared with other World

Judo events proved by the fact that several olympic or world champions could not reach the podium. One more evidence of the sports level. The Judo Championship of FISU became a major international event on the calendar.

Analysing the results, the countries, who traditionally reach the first place on the world rank, confirmed their supremacy. By the number of medals, France is the first, before the USSR and Korea. Japan, having not delegated any women competitor, was

distanced by other countries. For the first time also, Japan was not on the podium for the team men competition, having being beaten by the team representing for the last time the students from the ex German Democratic Republic.

It should also be noted that the number of countries on the podium is constantly increasing, proving the development of judo in the smaller countries. Therefore 13 countries shared the medals among men and women on a total of 34 participating countries,

coming from the 5 continents, other symbol of the universality of this championship.

In conclusion, the excellent organisation of this event, its universality and its sports impact due to the ever increasing quality of the participation, must be stressed. The 11th World FISU Championship is over, good luck to the organisation of the 12th in 1992.
