

INTRODUCTION

After the inaugural edition of the FISU-AIPS YRP at the Shenzhen 2011 Summer Universiade, and subsequent successful editions around the world, most recently in Lake Placid and Chengdu in 2023, the programme returns to Europe for its eighth edition.

A vital stepping-stone for young reporters, this winter's programme seeks to give aspiring journalists the chance to develop and hone their skills as never before. Budding sports reporters from around the world will converge in Italy's Piemonte region to cover the Torino 2025 FISU World University Games as part of an all-expenses-paid assignment for two weeks this coming January.



For the Torino 2025 FISU World University Games in Italy (13-23 January 2025), **FISU and the AIPS will invite six aspiring young journalists** to cover the Games while receiving specialised media training.

The FISU-AIPS Young Reporters Programme brings together **21 to 25-year-old students** and recent graduates in journalism, communications and digital media from FISU's five associations of Africa, Americas, Asia, Oceania and Europe. They will report **throughout the FISU Games for 13 days, with full access to all the competition venues and the Main Press Centre. Living in an official event hotel, six international participants (selected by FISU) will be able to share their experience and learn from one another.**

FISU will select the Young Reporters based on their **profile and potential**. They could be university students engaged in communication, or digital media studies or recent graduates ready to embark on their full-time career in media.

FISU will cover the full cost of a return flight between their home and Torino. All participants will be provided with a meal allowance and accommodation on site.

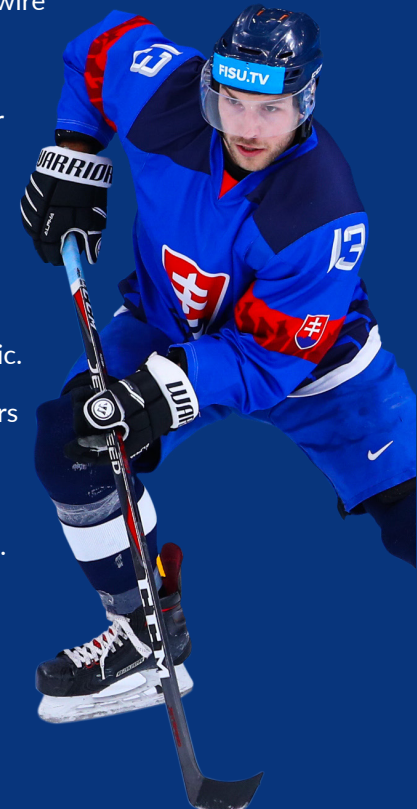

KEY ELEMENTS

- Training will centre around written press, multimedia, digital media, public relations and organisation of sports events.
- The Young Reporters will be required to participate in all training sessions and will have multiple reporting assignments.
- Assignments every day. Each participant must be able to produce content in the various areas of media and communication previously listed (i.e. written press, digital media etc).
- The programme instruction will be all in English.
- Essential technology needed for the course will be provided, but participants will be required to bring their own personal equipment (laptop computers, tablets, voice recorders, smartphones, etc.) as they see fit to fulfill their assignments.
- The cost of economy return air tickets and/or transport to Torino will be covered in full. Accommodation, meals and on-site transport are also covered.



- The 13-day project begins with an introduction to FISU and the FISU World University Games Winter. The first assignment begins with covering the event's opening ceremony (13 January 2025) and concludes with filing stories from the closing ceremony (23 January 2025). All candidates will produce articles and pieces of content each day. The content focus will centre on finding the hidden gems and human interest stories of these Games. In other words, come with the dexterity to cover much more than the game reports!
- Coursework will include essential elements of event coverage, including writing interviewing, photos and video, digital and social media content. Each Young Reporter must participate in all facets of the programme.
- There will be plenty of opportunities for assigned stories, photos and video to be published on various Games media and information platforms. These stories will not be exclusive and may be picked up by local media and wire services, as well as the official event media.
- All Young Reporters will receive assessments of their work throughout the course by mentors and a Certificate of Participation upon completion.
- The FISU Media team may offer freelance work opportunities to cover future FISU events to those demonstrating outstanding achievement and work ethic.
- YRP participants will automatically become members of a growing FISU U-Media reporters network, and may receive freelance or internship assignments to cover national and continental university sports events.



FISU YRP SELECTION CRITERIA

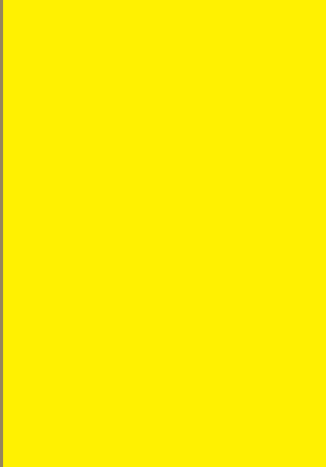
- Candidates for participation in the programme are full-time or part-time students in journalism, communications, and digital media studies aged 21-25, having completed at least one (1) year of university studies.
- Recent graduates working in similar entry-level positions in news and media organisations are also invited to apply for participation in the YRP.
- Selected participants should be available for the full duration of the YRP programme for 14 days from 11-24 January 2025, which includes the entire duration of the Torino 2025 FISU World University Games.
- Candidates will be selected based on a CV and motivation letter, outlining their previous experience and how they think their skills are well suited for the programme.
- Links to any previous work, experience and portfolio if available are welcomed
- Candidates must be willing to sign an agreement, setting out conditions as part of their participation in the FISU-AIPS Young Reporters Programme, which will include copyright-free usage of their course content during and after the Torino 2025 FISU World University Games.
- All candidates must have a valid passport for international travel (minimum validity until July 2025). Upon selection, candidates will be provided with correct paperwork and visa information for entry into Italy if needed.
- The final decision on the suitability of nominated candidates remains with FISU. Exceptions may be made to the criteria, depending on the needs identified for the programme.



ADDITIONAL SELECTION CRITERIA

- Fluency in any other language (in addition to English) is considered an asset. French, Spanish and Chinese in particular are highly desirable.
- Experience and specific knowledge of sports is also considered an asset to applications.

CALL FOR APPLICATIONS

Individuals applying for the FISU-AIPS Young Reporters Programme are required to submit the following documents in English only:

- CV listing applicant's previous experience and education
- Motivation letter (max. one page)
- Links to previously published work, experience, or portfolio
- Two reference letters (professional references only)
- Copy of passport with a validity of at least six (6) months after the Games end (i.e. valid until at least July 2025)
- Official documentation confirming the level of English knowledge (for those from non-English speaking countries—TOEFL, IELTS or other equivalent certification)*

Applications will be accepted until 20 October 2024. Applications submitted after this date, or applications missing the above documentation requested, will NOT be taken into consideration.

For ALL applicants: Complete applications are to be addressed to FISU Media and Communication at youngreporters@fisu.net.

Only complete applications sent in PDF format will be considered. A video interview may also be conducted for the final selection to assess English language proficiency. Candidates will be duly informed of the process on an individual basis.

*FISU and the Organising Committee have the right to conduct additional testing or interviews to evaluate English proficiency.
