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HISTORY

Padel has recently been recognised by FISU and is poised to join the Championships programme in early 2025. The meteoric rise of Padel over the past few years is a testament to its universal appeal, accessibility, and the exhilarating nature of the game, captivating both participants and spectators, transcending cultural and geographical boundaries. The increasing number of active players and burgeoning federations around the world signifies that Padel is firmly establishing itself as a cornerstone of contemporary sports culture.

Incorporating Padel into FISU's official sports programme presents an exhilarating opportunity to engage a new generation of university athletes while expanding the variety of competitions available. Its dynamic nature makes Padel ideal for both competitive and recreational university events, fostering teamwork and camaraderie while inspiring excellence across campuses worldwide.

The first edition of the FISU World University Championship will take place in Malaga, in 2026.

REGISTRATION PROCEDURES 4.

GENERAL ENTRY (DEADLINE: -6 MONTHS TO THE EVENT)

The General Entry is the first stage of the registration process, where delegations are invited to register, through the NUSFs, for the Championship indicating a general interest in participating in the event.

Teams and athletes are not required to submit any documentation or undergo a selection processes.

The submission of a General Entry Form is non-binding, indicating only initial interest by the NUSF but not final commitment





4.2. QUANTITATIVE ENTRY (DEADLINE: -3 MONTHS TO THE EVENT)

During the Quantitative Entry the NUSF delegation commits to participate and confirms the delegation composition in terms of numbers and although it does not yet provide individual details, it requires the NUSFs to submit an accurate count of delegation members.

At this stage, a 50% payment of the participation fees is due and must be settled by the Quantitative Entry deadline. By proceeding with the payment, the delegation confirms its participation in the Championship.

This deposit serves as a participation guarantee, and is non-refundable in case of withdrawal, with refunds subject to FISU General Regulations and any OC-specific cancellation policies

4.2.1. PARTICIPANTS SELECTION

In the event of receiving more registrations than the number of spots available for a category or competition, FISU Championships Department will coordinate the participants selection three months before the Championship following the below criteria:

- a) Host country
- b) Next host
- c) Quantitative entries 50% payment
- d) National and/or Continental distribution and representativity following the FIP World Ranking by National Teams
- e) If there are still available slots following the initial round of selection (one team per delegation, where feasible), the process will restart at criterion "a)" for a delegation's second team

4.3. INDIVIDUAL ENTRY (DEADLINE: -1 MONTH TO THE EVENT)

The Individual Entry is the final step in FISU event registration. The NUSF must provide all relevant data and documentation for each delegation member.

The remaining 50% of the participation fees is paid in full to the Organising Committee by this deadline. Failure to do so may result in non-participation in the Championship, unless specifically approved by the Organising Committee


Should a delegation fail to complete the final payment by the specified deadline (-1 month to the event), the delegation will forfeit their place, and the first reserve athlete will be offered the opportunity to participate

5. SPORT REGULATIONS

The Padel tournaments shall be organised in accordance with the relevant Federación Internacional de Padel (FIP) Tour regulations, unless otherwise stated. In case of dispute in the interpretation of the rules, the Spanish text shall be regarded as authoritative.

The competition shall last 5 days as indicated in the General Schedule (Section 3) and the competition programme shall be proposed by the FISU TCC and confirmed by the Organising Committee Competition Manager, including the following events:

- Men pairs
- Women pairs
- Mixed pairs

5.1. COMPETITION

A maximum of 32 teams per competition will be accepted. If the registration exceeds the maximum number, a team selection will be organised. If approved by FISU, FIP and the Organising Committee, more participants may be accepted

Mixed Teams can be composed by players also competing in the Men's and Women's Teams tournaments

5.1.2. ROUNDS

- Day 1: Round of 32
- Day 2: Round of 16
- Day 3: Quarter-finals
- Day 4: Semi-finals
- Day 5: Bronze medal matches and Finals

All events are full ranking tournaments, meaning that teams will compete for every position in the final standings, except in the mixed category, where no further matches will be played after elimination



5.2. TOURNAMENT FORMAT

5.2.1. COMPETITION SYSTEM

A. Game format

- Unless otherwise specified for the requirements of the Tournament, all matches will be played as the
 best of 3 sets. In the event of a tie at 6 games, a "Tie-Break" or "Sudden Death" will be played to
 determine the set.
- All tournaments will employ the scoring method of "Golden Point".

B. Results Management System

• The event is required to utilise the FIP Results Management System, with FIP responsible for the provision and management of the system.

C. Seeding Order Criteria

For the inaugural event, the seeding criteria will adhere to the FIP World Ranking of National Teams. From the second edition onwards, the seeding criteria will be as follows:

- The seeding order criteria will be determined by the results of the two previous editions, if applicable, along with the FIP Individual Ranking in effect on the day of the draw.
- To calculate a team's points, the points of both players will be combined. If neither player appears in the FIP Individual Ranking, their score will be considered as 0 points.
- The order of the seeded players will be established based on the total points accumulated. In the event that two or more pairs have the same number of points, the order will be determined by the player with the highest ranking.
- If none of the registered players have points in the FIP Individual Ranking, all participants will be entered into a completely random draw.

D. Draw

Draw procedure for 32 teams (8 top seeds):

- Seed 1 will be placed in the first line.
- Seed 2 will be positioned in the last line.
- Seeds 3 and 4 will be drawn between them, ensuring they do not meet Seed 1 or Seed 2 until the semifinals, nor each other until the final.
 - o Draw in lines 16 and 17.
- Seeds 5, 6, 7, and 8 will be drawn in between the previous Seeds, avoiding meetings with Seeds 1, 2, 3, and 4 until the quarter-finals, and avoiding each other until the semifinals.
 - o Draw in lines 8, 9, 24, and 25.
- The remaining teams will be drawn randomly to complete the entire draw.

E. Rest Between Matches

- When required, if the schedule includes more than one match in a day for the same team, the Umpire
 will permit a rest period for the affected teams if their previous match is immediately followed by their
 upcoming match, unless both teams agree to begin earlier.
- Exceptions will be determined by the FISU TCC only in cases of force majeure. The Umpire will be informed prior to any notice of schedule changes.

Apart from exceptional cases, the players cannot play more than 2 matches a day. Exceptions will be determined by the Umpire, who will inform the FISU TCC prior to giving notice of scheduled changes

5.2.2. TEAM CLASSIFICATION

- The Team Classification is determined by summing the points scored by a delegation's best teams across all 3 tournaments (Men's Team, Women's Team, and Mixed Team).
- Only the points achieved by the best ranked team in each category are considered, not the total sum of points if a national team has more than one pair per tournament.
- Only those delegations that compete in all 3 tournaments with at least 1 team in each tournament (Men's Team, Women's Team, and Mixed Team) will be considered for the Team Classification.

5.3. DELEGATIONS COMPOSITION

All participating players and coaches will require a valid Padel License issued by their respective national federation. Additionally, both players within the same pair are required to have licenses issued by the same national federation as a condition of entry

Players must follow FIP rules regarding the players' attire (see section 7.4)





At the Technical Meeting, the Head of Delegation or his/her representative shall confirm and sign the official list of competitors accredited by the CIC

5.3.2. OFFICIALS

6. TECHNICAL OFFICIALS

6.1. INTERNATIONAL TECHNICAL OFFICIALS

For the FISU Championship, the ITOs are appointed by FIP, with the endorsement of FISU. This appointment process considers several critical factors, including the number of participants, the level and availability of NTOs, and the goal to minimise expenses when possible. To achieve cost-efficiency, FIP will aim to nominate ITOs from neighbouring countries whenever feasible. This approach not only fosters regional cooperation but also optimises resources.

6.1.1. NUMBER & ROLES OF ITOS

The number of ITOs may vary depending on the distance between the courts. The FISU TCC and FIP will need to validate each venue to determine the required number of ITOs.

^{*}In terms of minimizing costs, FIP will appoint 2 out of the 6 Judge Umpire as the 2 Chair Umpire for the Bronze, Semifinals and Final matches.

ITOs can come from the Host Country

NTOs are not required for Padel events, as all technical officials are qualified to officiate at both national and international competitions.

6.1.2. ITOs Costs

According to the Collaboration Convention signed between FISU and FIP, the costs of the ITOs are covered by the Organising Committee. The per diem will follow the national rate stipulated by the National Federation of the country where the championship will be organised.

This national rate is subject to be revised and change every year.

For 2025, the following tax regulations apply to the rates (any future changes will be applied automatically):

 - Height 8m (minimum 6m)
- Safety distance 4m
- Lighting 1.000 lux

7.4. PLAYERS' ATTIRE / UNIFORMS

Players on the same team must wear the same colours and refrain from using logos of other Continental or International Associations. In the event that teams have matching colours in the same match, the higher-ranked team will have preference, and the lower-ranked team will change to a different colour. It will be mandatory for each team to bring two sets of different colours.

8. TRAININGS

The Organising Committee is responsible for coordinating and communicating the training schedule to each delegation, ensuring appropriate access to facilities based on the sport and competition schedule. Some of the factors to be considered are:

- Create a training schedule based on the indications of the FISU TCC
- Consider the usage of the main competition venue, if needed and appropriate
- Provide hydration and basic medical assistance for training sessions
- Share a detailed training plan with each delegation at least 48 hours before their arrival
- Ensure training venue availability throughout the Championship

The Organising Committee should expect requests for training sessions up to 4 days prior to the start of the event. Most nations will require training facilities 2 days prior to the competition

9. MEDICAL SERVICES

A. FISU Requirements

- First aid and Emergency Medical care
- Medical transportation
- OC on-call first aid medical services shall be available on a 24-hour basis
- A minimum of two ambulances per venue should be available and on duty from the start of warm-up until at least 45 minutes after the final competition of the day

B. Participants Medical Insurance

All participants must have valid travel medical insurance, covering:

- 24/7 Emergency Assistance
- Emergency Medical Expenses
- Medical Evacuation/Repatriation
- Trip Cancellation/Interruption
- Accidental Death or Injury

The OC is solely responsible for providing first aid, emergency medical care, and transportation to the designated hospital. All other medical costs shall be borne by the participant's insurance

10. DOPING CONTROL

A. FISU Requirements

- The requirements regarding the number and type of doping tests, as well as the total number of tests to
 be conducted, can be found in the FISU Doping Test Requirements document. This information is
 available exclusively to the Organising Committee.
- The OC Doctor or Head of the Medical area shall coordinate the doping testing and contact the FISU CMI to clarify the moment or disciplines in which the tests will be carried out.
- All doping tests costs (including collection, transportation, laboratory analyses) shall be borne by the Organising Committee.

B. Athletes Selection

Athletes are eligible for testing once accredited until departing from the official event accommodation.

11. PROTOCOL, SPORT PRESENTATION & AWARDING

11.1. MEDALS TABLE

A. FISU Requirements

Medals

The table below provides a comprehensive overview of the total number of medals awarded across all competition disciplines. Please note that extra/reserve medal sets and the FISU set are not included in these figures.

The Organising Committee is responsible for providing the medals as shown in the table above. Medals must be awarded for all individual and mixed team events. The top three athletes/teams in each discipline (individual and mixed relay) are eligible for medals.

The Organising Committee must provide FISU with a set of medals of the event

Trophies

The Organising Committee shall present a trophy to the nation winning the Team Classification, based on the points calculated according to section 5.2.2.

Only the winning team receives the trophy as overall winner of the competition

B. Recommendations & Considerations

It is crucial to have additional sets of medals on hand as a contingency. Some medals may be defective and may need to be replaced.

Medals are not mandatory for Officials in Padel





11.2. SPORT PRESENTATION

Sports presentation is vital for elevating a Championship from a competition to an unforgettable experience. It encompasses everything from music and lighting to commentary and fan engagement, creating a unique atmosphere that engages the audience.

In case there is a big screen in the venue for the spectators, some educational video (provided by FIP) regarding the rules of the sport can be displayed at the beginning of the competition day

A. FISU Requirements

Audio Elements

- o Sound System: A high-quality sound system is essential for announcements, music, and commentary, ensuring clear communication and an engaging atmosphere.
- o Microphone: Essential for general announcements such as schedule, results, athletes introduction, general information, and others.
- Thematic Music: Curate an energetic playlist to be played during introductions, warm-ups, and medal ceremonies to elevate the excitement.

Commentary and Announcing

 Live Announcements: Make timely announcements regarding event schedules, match results, and athlete backgrounds to keep the audience informed and engaged.

Athletes Introduction

 Ceremonial Introductions: Develop exciting and personalised introductions for the athletes, showcasing their achievements and backgrounds.

B. Recommendations & Considerations

Audio Elements

 DJ: Enhances the atmosphere and overall experience of a sports competition, by creating and maintaining energy, motivating the athletes and engaging the crowd.

Music is permitted only between points and during rest periods. This must always adhere to the maximum time limits: 20 seconds between points, 60 seconds for side changes, and 120 seconds between sets

Commentary and Announcing

 Engaging Commentary: Hire knowledgeable commentators who can provide insights about the athletes, techniques, and strategies. This adds depth to the viewing experience.

These elements are highly recommendable at least for the Semi-finals and Finals

11.3. PADEL PRE-COMPETITION PROTOCOL

A. Athletes Introduction

Event Host:

"Now, let's introduce our contenders for the [men's doubles / women's doubles / mixed doubles] tournament! Please join me in welcoming our athletes with enthusiasm!"

- Country Flag Display (if any big screen available)
 - o "Representing [Country], we have [Athlete's Name]!"





- "[He/She] recently finished [insert notable performance], and holds a personal best of [insert time, if available]."
- "Notably, [he/she] has also won [mention any major titles or accolades, such as national championships]."

12. SERVICES

The Organising Committee should provide a variety of services for the event, including:

- Ice
- Laundry
- Wi-Fi

The Organising Committee should secure reliable physiotherapy services (if not provided by the Organising Committee), anticipating the request from teams and establishing clear procedures for these services procurement, including pricing and how to access them

Teams are encouraged to include a Physiotherapist in their delegation, within the allocated quota for officials

12.1. ICE

The supply of ice is one of the most common requests from participating delegations, particularly for injury treatment and recovery purposes.

The Organising Committee must supply ice for treating injuries during both practice and competition, as
part of the medical coverage for the event. It does not cover large quantities of ice needed for recovery
treatments, such as cryotherapy.

The Organising Committee secure a reliable ice provider on standby, anticipating the request from teams and establishing clear procedures for ice procurement, including pricing and how to access this service





12.2. LAUNDRY

Laundry services are essential for many sports, particularly in long-duration competitions and team sports, where athletes may require frequent changes of clothing.

- Laundry services must be provided in all Team Sports Championships and in all sports with more than four competition days.
- Self-Service or Full-Service Laundry can be considered (hotel/accommodation and external services included in the latter)

Self-Service is the preferred option, giving more flexibility and control to the teams. If not, it is important to negotiate reduced pricing and adjust the timing for collection/delivery of uniforms with the provider

12.3. WI-FI

Wi-Fi is an essential service for university students, as it serves as a critical infrastructure that fosters communication and supports their academic responsibilities.

- Participants can easily access real-time information about event schedules, results, and updates. This allows them to plan their day effectively, ensuring they don't miss out on key events and activities.
- Participants can engage with live broadcasts, social media updates, and other digital content related to the event.
- For many students, academic responsibilities continue even during events. Wi-Fi connection ensures they can access study materials and educational resources, maintain communication with professors, and keep up with online courses.

Wi-Fi should be provided free of charge for all participants at the event, both at the accommodation sites and at the competition venues
